# CHOOSE GREEN



## BETTER TRANSPORT



**GREENS** would be tougher with the bus companies and invest more in rail, tram and cycle routes.



**LABOUR** has caused chaos on the city's buses and failed to tackle poor air quality.



## VALUE FOR MONEY



**GREENS** would keep more council services in-house. We would open up contracts to public scrutiny.



**LABOUR** are cutting vital services to pay for the big contracts signed by both Labour and Lib Dems.



## MORE HOUSING



**GREENS** would build more and better quality housing and work to improve standards for private rented homes.



**LABOUR** cut support for tenants and residents groups, and rejected solar power plans that would have cut bills.



## LOWER ENERGY BILLS



**GREENS** would invest in clean energy and insulating homes. This saves money and creates jobs.



**LABOUR** still support nuclear power, have refused to oppose fracking and took us to war over oil.



## LISTENING COUNCIL



**GREENS** would record council meetings for public viewing. We respect the referendum rejecting an elected mayor.



**LABOUR** have ignored 10,000+ signature petitions and refused to answer Freedom of Information requests.

## GREEN ACTION

Green Councillors have worked to stop litter and fly-tipping and deal with anti-social behaviour. We have challenged the policy of selling public services without public scrutiny.

We opposed plans for a new elected mayor, rejected in a 2012 referendum.



'20's plenty'. Greens support improved safety for all on our residential streets.

In the council budget we proposed to:

- Cut the price of residents' parking permits
- Cut executive pay in the Council
- Invest £6.5 million in cutting fuel bills for homes and schools

We also found extra money to:

- Cut air pollution from taxis
- Improve road safety and public transport
- Save vital care for the elderly and disabled

All were rejected by the ruling Labour group.
